Theme: According to Mark, on the first day of the week, the women rise with the sun and buy spices to anoint Jesus' body. They are shocked to find the tomb empty, and leave in fear and terror. Mark's resurrection story is less triumphant than the other Gospel testimonies (as scholars believe the remainder of Mark's gospel was a later addition). In Mark's version, we are reminded that Easter comes to us, again and again, even if we don't know what to make of God's resurrection ways. Again and again, the sun rises. And some days, that is enough.

1040 for Peace hosts webinar: "Martin Luther King on Racism and War" 7:30 p.m., Wednesday evening, April 7 Featuring Dr. Drew G.I. Hart and Rev. Joanna Lawrence Shenk and hosted by Titus Peachey. Dr. Hart is an activist, pastor, and a professor at Messiah University. He is the author of *Trouble I've Seen:* Changing the Way the Church Views Racism (2016) the recent Who Will be a Witness? Igniting Activism for God's Justice, Love and Deliverance (2020). Rev. Shenk is associate pastor of the First Mennonite Church of San Francisco and former associate for Interchurch Relations and Communications at Mennonite Church, USA. Shenk interviewed Vincent Harding a few years before his death, and published *The Movement Makes Us Human:* An Interview with Dr Vincent Harding on Mennonites, Vietnam, and MLK, Wipf & Stock, 2018.
