There was a period in my life where I moved every one to three years. Every new move brought change and I do have to admit at times it was quite exciting to experience something new and different. As Wade and I talked together about our future and where we would go after Guatemala, we decided that we wanted to go "home". We made a choice to put down our roots and stay awhile. Now here we are eleven years later still in the same place.

In all of our journeys we have periods of upheaval. God is moving and perhaps making us move. Sometimes this means physically moving, while other times it may be spiritual. There is change and there is something new. These can be times of excitement and wonder because it is often quite evident that God is at work.

But what about the times when we stay put? I have been wrestling with this question a lot lately. What does it mean to be in a place and find contentment and joy being there? Maybe it's not new. Most likely it could be the same, ordinary thing. Is God still working?

One of my favorite places to go when I was at Messiah College was a bench that sat right by the Yellow Breaches Creek. Inscribed on the stone-slab seat was "Like a tree planted by streams of water". This comes from the very first Psalm that describes a person who delights in God's word as a "tree planted by streams of water, which yields its fruit in season and whose leaf does not wither" (verse 3).

What is that tree like? The roots must go down deep, not only to support the heavy yield of fruit, but also to

draw water deeply from the ground. Even when there is no rain the tree still thrives with abundance. It can reach to the heavens and spread out wide its branches.

What an image for us! There is something beautiful about putting down those deep roots. When we root ourselves in God, we too grow strong and don't wither in times of trial. I think many of us have related this image to our relationship to God.

But what about our relationship with each other? What does it look like when we put down roots with a faith community? I would hope that this would mean that we support one another and build each other up so that we can stand tall in our faith, yet also allow ourselves to grow out into new places. I also hope that we could draw deeply from one other to nourish ourselves so that in times of drought we do not wither. As a community we extend our roots down deep and grow ever upward and outward.

So how does this happen? First, we need to be committed to one another to give that time and space for growth together. We also need to trust one another and trust that the God who loves us abundantly more than we can imagine is at work in all of our lives doing a "new thing" even when we are staying put. And of course a little faith, hope, and love never hurts either.

Are we ready to grow those roots deeper - together? Are we ready to reach up to heaven - together? Are we ready to spread out wide our branches into our community - together? For we are a community of trees planted by a Master Gardener who has amazing plans in store.

As we teach the children about Jesus it's hard sometimes to help them understand some things like faith, forgiveness and love as these are not things you can see. I recently read about a father whose son was always getting into trouble and apologized when confronted. He knew his parents would always forgive

him. Finally the father took him to the garage and picked up a hammer and nail and told him to hammer the nail into the wall. Then gave him the hammer and told him pull out the nail. The father said when you do something wrong it's like pounding in a nail. Forgiveness is when you pull it out. They boy said he understands that. Then the father asked him to take the hammer and pull out the nail hole. That's impossible he said you can't do that. So each time you do something wrong we forgive you but you do leave a scar behind. This example has helped me to understand forgiveness. As over time I see how you can fill in those holes that are left behind as you move on. However if you continue to need forgiveness it makes the process that much harder. I hope some of you can relate to this as I have.
